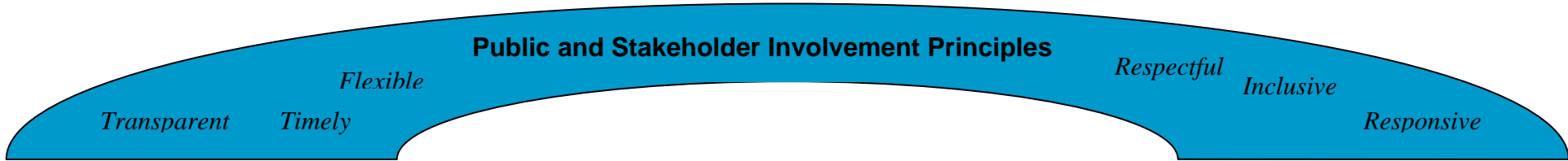

Definition	Increasing awareness of Alberta's environment through information.	An opportunity for stakeholders to understand and provide feedback to Alberta Environment	A mutually beneficial cooperative relationship between stakeholders and Alberta Environment to work together to achieve a common goal	An ongoing formal relationship between two or more organizations established in order to accomplish a shared outcome	Policy implementation responsibilities and decision-making undertaken by delegated authorities
